



ABC Level 2 Award in Counselling Concepts

Frequently Asked Questions

What academic standard is Level 2?

- It is equivalent to a GCSE qualification.

How long is the course?

- This is a 30-hour introductory course in counselling. It is delivered in two formats:
 - 10 evenings in 10 consecutive weeks – each evening is from 6 – 9pm (3 hours training)
 - 5 days in five consecutive weeks – each day is from 9.30 – 4.30pm (6 hours training)

What is covered in this course?

This course is made up of 3 units:

- Unit 1 – the Professional Context of Counselling which includes counselling concepts and three most commonly applied counselling approaches: Psychodynamic, Person-centred and Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT).
- Unit 2 – Communication Skills in Helping Relationships: six basic counselling skills are introduced, and students are supported to apply the skills competently in small group practice sessions.
- Unit 3 – Personal Development: students are supported to reflect on their learning of theory, practice and of themselves in each of the five journal entries.

How are students assessed?

- Written assessment:
 - There is NO exam and students are assessed through their written work.
 - Students are to complete homework by answering specific questions set in the Handbook after each training session.
 - Students are to write five reflective journals to show personal development.
 - All written work is marked and internally moderated. Some work is subject to ABC External Verification.
- Skills practice:
 - Students are continually assessed in the 6 listening skills practice sessions.
- Attendance:
 - Students are required to attend a minimum of 80% of the course to pass.

What do I need for the course?

- Students will need access to a computer and be competent in word processing to complete written work. Also, there are course learning materials to download from the Sherwood e-Learning Site called Moodle.
- All written work should be typed and stored on a computer or on a memory stick.
- There is no obligation to purchase any textbooks though further learning through reading is encouraged.

How much study/homework time is required per week?

- This entirely depends on individual's learning style and capacity. On average,
 - for the 10-week course, students will require to set aside 3-4 study hours per week.
 - for the 5-week fast-track course, students will require to set aside 6-8 study hours per week.

How much is the course fee?

- The course fee is £350 for 2018-19

How many places are there on the course?

- There are 15 places available per intake.



Who can apply?

- Anyone who is interested in learning fundamental counselling concepts or would like to improve on their listening skills are welcome to apply.
- There is NO requirement of previous academic qualification or work experience in this field.
- This is an open access course, and you are expected to take responsibility for your own learning.

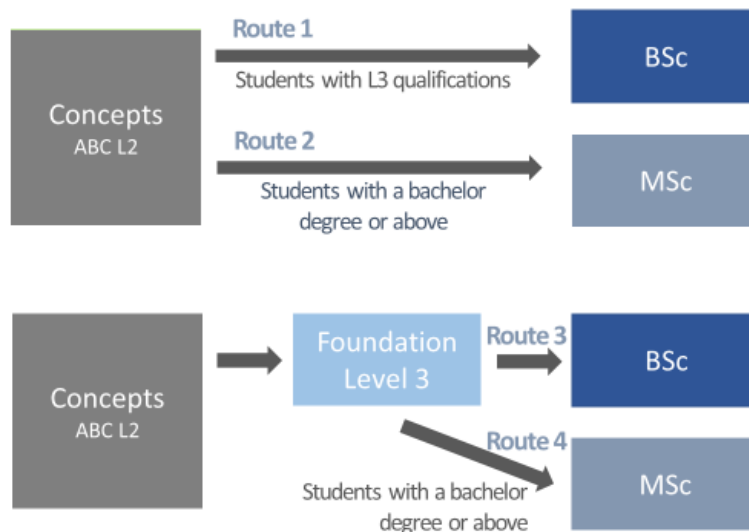
How to apply?

- Complete the application form which can be downloaded from the SPTI website www.spti.net.
- Submit the application form together with ONE reference to support your application.
- Once your application is approved, please pay the course fee to secure your place on the course.
- Offers are made in a first come first serve basis.
